There are six domains in History/Social Science: World History (domain 1), U.S. History (domain 2), California History (domain 3), Principles of American Democracy (domain 4), Principles of Economics (domain 5), & Principles of Geography (domain 6). The CSET groups the domains as follows: Subtest 1 (Domains 1 & 6); Subtest 2 (Domains 2 & 6), & Subtest 3 (Domains 3, 4, & 5). This table will be used to determine domains where candidates meet subject matter via coursework.
