#### **TOTAL GENERAL EDUCATION UNITS REQUIRED: 51\***

\*9 of your 51 general education units must be upper division and taken after you complete 60 units. CSULB accepts a maximum of 39 certified general education units from California community colleges.

\*6 of the 9 upper division units must be interdisciplinary courses (IC suffix).

\*Some degree programs require less than 51 general education units (see the Academic Advising Center for specific exemptions).

#### **Interdisciplinary Courses**

Interdisciplinary courses are required as a part of your general education--breadth requirements. You must complete six units of courses with the "IC" suffix before graduation in any of the categories specified, but no more than three units may be counted in any one category. IC courses may be approved for exemption from the three-unit-per-category limit (to a maximum of six units) when two or more schools are involved. Interdisciplinary courses are all upper-division courses; they fulfill six of the nine units required at the upper-division level in the new general education requirements. Descriptions of the IC courses to be offered this semester, which are not listed in the 1983-85 University, *Bulletin*, are shown under Variable and Special Topics course descriptions at the end of this *Schedule of Classes*.
