GENERAL EDUCATION

CSULB General Education Requirements (51 Units Total)

- 51 units of General Education course work must include three units of work in U.S. History and three units in U.S. Constitution and American Ideals (required by Section 40404 of Title 5, California Administrative Code). A student who has met these requirements prior to enrollment at CSULB is exempt.
- Cross categorized courses may count in only one category, not both.
- Courses in the student's major department may not be used to satisfy G.E. requirements (per Policy Statement 91-00-revision 5/94). Exceptions are:
 1. Category A.
 2. Category B.1.a. for majors in the life science departments and in B.2 for majors in Department of Mathematics.
 3. Category C.1 and C.3 for majors in the Departments of Art and Music.
 4. Category D.1.a. for majors in the Department of History.
 5. Category D.1.b. for majors in the Department of Political Science.
 6. All Interdisciplinary Courses (I) in ALL categories.
 7. All Human Diversity Courses in all categories.
- CSULB accepts a maximum of 39 certified General Education units from California community colleges.

GE Requirements for Continuing and Transfer Students (1998-99 and earlier *Catalogs*)

- Nine (9) of your 51 General Education units must be upper division and taken after you complete 60 units. Six (6) of the 9 upper division units must be interdisciplinary courses (I suffix). These 9 units must be completed at CSULB.
- **Interdisciplinary Courses** - are required as a part of your General Education - breadth requirements. You must complete six units of courses with the "I" suffix in any of the categories specified. These units must be completed BEFORE graduation. Interdisciplinary courses are all upper-division courses: they fulfill six of the nine required at the upper-division level in the General Education requirements.
- **Human Diversity courses** - One 3-unit course (denoted with an ♦), in this publication under 'General Education Course Listing', must be completed BEFORE graduation. These courses occur in several categories as lower and upper division. Required for students under the 1993-94 and subsequent *Catalogs*.

GE Requirements for First Time Freshmen Entering Fall 1999 (1999-2000 *Catalog*)

The General Education program consists of three stages:

Foundation, which must be completed within the first 36 units. The Foundation consists of UNIV 100 (1 unit) plus one 3-unit course each from General Education categories A1, A2, A3, and B2. Each Foundation course must be completed with a grade of C or better.

Explorations, 30 additional General Education units selected from courses meeting the distribution requirements. (See GE Courses By Category on pages 20-22.) Explorations Courses numbered between 100 and 199 may be taken at the same time as Foundation courses, provided any prerequisites or corequisites have been met. Corequisites & prerequisites are listed in the CSULB *Catalog*. Explorations courses numbered 200 or higher require the entire Foundation as prerequisite.

Capstone, 9 units. All Capstone courses are numbered at the 300- or 400- level, and require upper division standing, completion of the Foundation, and completion of one or more Explorations courses as prerequisites. Capstone courses should be chosen to meet any remaining distribution requirements. The Capstone requirement must be completed at CSULB. For Fall 1999, all courses carrying the "I" suffix (Interdisciplinary Courses) will meet the Capstone requirement. Refer to the CSULB *Catalog* for additional information concerning the Capstone.

Two additional requirements may be met with either Explorations or Capstone courses:

- **Global Issues:** At least 3 units which focus on global issues or world societies and cultures. (In Fall 1999, all courses in General Education category D2a meet the Global Issues requirement.)
- **Human Diversity:** At least 3 units which focus on instructive examples of human diversity. These courses are designated with a ♦ in the list that follows.

GENERAL EDUCATION

Special Note on Program Planning:

In addition to courses to complete the General Education requirement, and the requirements of your major, you may have the opportunity to take a variety of elective courses. Careful choosing of courses may allow you to take courses which will fill more than one kind of requirement (e.g., both Human Diversity and Interdisciplinary Course), thus freeing you to take more electives or to pursue a minor or a certificate program. You should seek the assistance of an academic advisor in planning a comprehensive program.

To aid you in the process of developing a meaningful and integrative program in General Education, the University offers these forms of assistance:

- Academic advising, including assistance with General Education throughout the year in the Academic Advising Center and in departmental and college offices.
- A special listing each semester, in this publication of those courses which the faculty have specified as being appropriate for the General Education requirement in each category. Only courses specifically approved for General Education and listed in the *Schedule of Classes* for the semester in which you take the course may be used to fulfill General Education requirements.
- "Planning Your Academic Program" (page 6) provides information and suggestions on how to maximize your educational opportunities through General Education and the wise use of electives.
- General Education "Pathways", suggested sequences of courses that will satisfy General Education requirements while allowing you to explore particular areas of interest or learn more about potential majors. A number of Pathways are now being developed. Contact the Academic Advising Center at (562) 985-4837, or your major department for information on available Pathways.
