- 2. Minutes from February 14<sup>th</sup>, 2024 Meeting approved.
- 3. Announcements
  - a. Welcome Rajbir Judge, History Dept. Only here for one semester for CLA.
  - b. Kay Lee-Fruman, Biology Dept. Here for Spring 2024 for CNSM.
  - c. AB 928. Will likely impact GWAR. <u>https://www.calstate.edu/impact-of-the-csu/student-success/AB-928</u>
- 4. Consent Calendar
  - a. GWAR recommends CHLS 412A be a Writing Intensive (WI) course.
- 5. Proposed name change from the Minor in Criminal Justice to the **Minor in Criminology and Criminal Justice** – (First Reading) (Time Certain: 2:15pm)
  - a. They changed the name of the department and the major ten years ago, and this change brings the minor in line with those.
  - b. Q: Will this confuse the students in the minor? A: No.
  - c. Teachout plan is to graduate current students with the new name.
  - d. No change in courses.
  - e. Suggestion from Enrollment Services: Send a note to students currently in the minor when this passes.
  - f. Can be effective for the fall.



- g. First reading waived.
- h. 15 in favor, 0 opposed, 0 abstained. Passed.
- 6. New proposed certificate, **Undergraduate Certificate in Public Health Informatics & Technology** – (Second Reading) (Time Certain: 2:40pm)
  - a. Discussion of the process for waiving pre-reqs. What is the clearest way to make sure students are prepared but still accept students with reasonable equivalencies? Donna: Work with Enrollment Services and figure out what all the equivalent prereqs are. This can be automated.
  - b. Can 360 be a possible re-req for 460a, or can they take in any order? A: You can take this in any order. 260 needs to be taken first, and that is the only sequencing.
  - c. Comment: Pre-req GPA of 2.0 seems a bit low. Discussion of what the appropriate GPA would be. Maybe 2.5. Check to see if our certificate policy requires a specific minimum GPA?
  - d. Comment: There needs to be a course devoted to the ethical use of data. Response: Data privacy is woven through the courses. And there is an elective course on the ethical use of data.
  - e. Confirmation that Certificates need a min GPA of 2.5.
  - f. 10 yes, 4 no, 2 abstain. Passed.
- 7. Review of proposed revisions to **Policy 12-12, Graduate Writing Assessment Requirement** – (Second Reading) (Time Certain: 3:00pm)
  - a. Jeff posted some new documents for context in Canvas.
  - b. Lori Brown, GWAR Coordinator and Chair, faculty in CBA.
  - c. Updates and context.
    - i. 2019 Global Research Institute Study (GSI)
      - 1. Only 20% courses had any writing SLOs.
      - 2. 3% 5000 words or more
      - 3. 10% had writing instructional activities.
      - 4. 10% required any writing in the first 3 weeks.
    - ii. In 2023, students fulfill GWAR req by taking GPE + 3-6 units (depending on GPE score), and then the WI course. Pass with C or Better. Some students place directly into WI course. For those who take 3-6 units, those are additional courses outside their normal path to grad.



- iii. New req 2023: Students must demonstrate writing competence at the upper division level.
- iv. Any pre or co-reqs for GWAR course must not increase units toward grad.
- v. Assessment of writing is now written into accreditation.
- vi. CSU Channel Islands has 4 courses from 1<sup>st</sup> year to grad.
- vii. CSULA specifies that two of those must be upper, one must be in the discipline.
- viii. San Marcos: Every course carrying degree credit must have 2500 words of writing.
  - ix. Humboldt: 1 UD writing course. Each unite reports their criteria and assessment.
  - x. Fullerton is working on theirs, and it is similar.
- xi. WAC: Writing across the curriculum. Does not require additional units for or delay graduation.
- xii. Replaces current process: high-stakes testing and student fee for GPE, additional 3-6 units of coursework.
- xiii. Exchanged for coursework and support services that support widely accepted writing pedagogy.
- xiv. 4 courses across time at CSULB. 2 of the 4 are satisfied by existing required LD GE writing courses and UD WI course. The remaining two will adopt a new course designation (W) wherein new or converted courses meet the remaining requirement and bridge the first year course and WI course.
- xv. Policy: 4 separate designated W and WI course from first to graduation.
  - 1. 1) A W-course in GE Area 2, Written Communication (such as AFRS 100B, AIS 100B, etc)
  - 2. A lower or upper division W course. (likely to be changed/replaced by Cal-GETC <u>https://www.calstate.edu/impact-of-the-csu/student-success/AB-928</u>)
    - a. Discussion (including via chat) about Cal-GETC (California General Education Transfer Curriculum).
  - 3. An upper division W-course in or specified by the dept's major.



- 4. An upper division WI course in the major/degree program serving as the statewide GWAR course requirement. Must complete two W course with a C or better to take WI course.
  - a. WI was always intended to be within the discipline, but currently, some students are taking them far outside their major.
- 5. Q: CNSM wants to know how courses get certified. There will be a slide on how to do this. Discipline-specific writing is prioritized, so things like lab reports would count for CNSM. There is a process for getting courses certified.
- 6. Q: Why bring writing into majors that don't do a lot of writing instead of keeping writing with experts in writing? A) We want them to get experience doing the type of writing that is expected of their discipline.
- 7. Q: Are we protecting students who switch majors from having to redo these? A: We may need to add language addressing that.
- xvi. Impact to depts/colleges
  - 1. Already there.
  - 2. Probably Cal-GETC.
  - 3. Requires action by programs.
  - 4. Programs with a WI can use that as course 4 of 4. Programs without a WI can choose further options.

Actions for course 3 or 4:

- 5. Submit an already writing intensive course for W designation.
- 6. Collab with similar majors to develop a writing focused W course that can serve multiple disciplines.
- 7. Select a GWAR-approved W or WI course to specify use in their major.
- 8. Redesign a current course to mee the GWAR W criteria.
- 9. Offer students the option to select one course from a list of GWAR approved courses.
- xvii. Kerry Johnson: Honors theses might be able to be included in this proposals.



- xviii. Course caps of 25 and 18 might be able to be negotiable.
  - xix. Word counts are not just finished words. They include revisions.
  - xx. Jeff: Please consider actual wording for next meeting. Send comments to Jeff.
- xxi. Q: How does this impact units to graduation? A from Jody: We must stay at 120 units to graduation. But with WAC, many of those units \*can\* be handled within the major.
