

As part of this celebration, we have invited Donna Uchizono, a Dance alum who received her BA in Dance in 1983, to be our Guest Artist. She has served as a mentor for Sugar Salon, DoublePlus at Gibney Dance Center, and currently through her own company's choreographic mentorship program, Shared Choreographic Practice. She founded the Artist Advisory Board at Danspace Project, initiated a panel series on issues in the Dance Field at Gibney, and served as a grant panelist for various funding institutions. I am thrilled she has returned to share her artistry and vision with us.

We would also like to acknowledge and remember Emeritus Professor Pat Finot, an educator and choreographer who was an integral part of the development and growth of the Department of Dance throughout her 27 years of service to California State University, Long Beach. We celebrate Pat's many contributions to CSULB Dance, in addition to her wit, humor, and killer fashion sense! We dedicate this concert to Pat.

ARTIST BIOS GUEST ARTIST

DONNAUCHIZONO is a dance artist based in New York City and the artistic director of Donna Uchizono Company, which has performed throughout the United States, Europe, South America, Australia, and Asia. Uchizono has received public and critical recognition for her innovative movement language and distinct wit, recognized by notable collaborations with Mikhail Baryshnikov, Paula Vogel, David Hammons, and Oliver Sacks. In 2011, after decades of criticallyacclaimed dance works that toured nationally and internationally, Donna Uchizono was identified by the New York Public Library for the Performing Arts (NYPL) and Dance Heritage Coalition as a master choreographer whose works require preservation. Donna Uchizono Company received a 2021 National Endowment for the Arts award for Phase One of the archival and preservation of her work. In addition to being a Guggenheim Fellow, United States Artists Fellow, and Bessie Award winner, Uchizono has been recognized by many awards including an Alpert Award in Dance and grants from the Rockefeller Foundation, National Dance Project, National Endowment for the Arts, New York State Council on the Arts, Creative Capital Foundation, Altria Group, Inc., the Jerome Foundation, the Joyce Mertz-Gilmore Foundation, Arts International, Foundation for Contemporary Performance, National Performance Network, Harkness Foundation for Dance, the Greenwall Foundation, Meet the Composer, among many others.

FACULTY

TSIAMBWOM M. AKUCHU is a street dance and theatre artist whose work has been presented on stages like the Kennedy Center and Joe's Pub at The Public. He often creates work for concert dance that stages hip-hop and street dance fused with physical theater to create a unique performance experience. He has been working for the past several years as a solo artist creating new work, performing his repertoire, and in stage plays for festivals and shows like the Arts On Site NYC, DANCE NOW New York Festival, TEDx Providence, Big Sky Summer Theatre Festival, and the Atlanta Spring for Spring Festival. Tsiambwom received his BA in Theatre from Georgia Southern University and his MFA in Theatre from the University of Montana. He's taught at Colby College and is currently an Assistant Professor of Dance at CSULB.

LORIN JOHNSON has been a Professor at CSULB Dance since 2006. His choreography has been commissioned nationally by the Pacific Symphony Orchestra at Segerstrom Concert Hall, LA Grand Ensemble in downtown Los Angeles, the Celebrate Dance festival, the Orange County Performing Arts Center's Invitational Dance Festival, the Laguna Dance Festival, the Dance Under the Stars Choreography Festival in Palm Springs, and at the Los Angeles Dance Invitational at the Ford Amphitheater. Johnson's choreography has been presented internationally at The Garage Museum in Moscow, Russia and at the Fabbrica Europa Dance Festival in Florence, Italy. He has also been an artist in residence at Skidmore College, New York and at the Orange County High School of the Arts in Southern California.

REBECCA LEMME is a choreographer, performer, educator, and visual artist, as well as Artistic Director of the performance group Acts of Matter. Currently an Associate Professor of Dance at CSULB, Rebecca has been commissioned and presented by LA Contemporary Dance Company, Visceral Dance Chicago, Santa Barbara Dance Theater, River North Dance Chicago, Thodos' New Dances, California Institute of the Arts, Loyola Marymount University, Columbia College Chicago, Loyola University Chicago, among others. Additionally, she has toured nationally with contemporary repertory companies Luna Negra Dance Theater and River North Dance Chicago. Lemme was formerly a full-time faculty member at CalArts and has additionally been on faculty at Columbia College Chicago, Roosevelt University, Hubbard Street's Lou Conte Dance Studio, Visceral Dance Center, and Joffrey Ballet Chicago. DANZEL THOMPSON-STOUT, a native of Allentown, PA is a performer, choreographer, and educator of Afro-American dance forms. With an embodied cultural history in street and club dance forms, Thompson-Stout commits to being an agent who brings authentic representation of these forms into the academy through his work as a choreographer and teaching as a Professor of Dance at CSULB. As a performer, he has worked with several street dance artists such as Rennie Harris, Kyle Clark, and Vince Johnson. He is a principal dancer for The Nance Dance Collective and a guest performer for the Stella Maris Dance Ensemble of Kingston, JA. He is one of the last generation of performers who has worked under Dr. Kariamu Welsh and holds a teaching certification in her contemporary African technique, "Umfundalai". Thompson-Stout holds a BFA in Dance from Temple University and an MFA in Dance from University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign.

ANDREW VACA has served CSULB Dance for almost 24 years as an instructor of jazz and modern dance, a creator of 26 original concert dances, and Department Chair (2011-2018). Andy began dancing with Dale Scholl at Sacramento State and later completed an MFA in dance at UCLA. He has danced in Jazzworks, Ririe-Woodbury Dance Company, Keith Johnson/Dancers, and was Assistant Project Coordinator for Kennedy Center Honoree Twyla Tharp's, THARP! With over 30 years in the sports dance team industry, Andy has choreographed nationally televised halftime shows, is an instructor with Pro Action Dance, and is a choreographer for the Pro Bowl Cheerleaders. He is proud to be the creator and Director of Masters Pro Dance Workshop, an annual fundraising event for CSULB Dance scholarships that celebrated its 10th year this October. Andy is the former President of the American College Dance Association and recently celebrated 15 years teaching for the LA Music Center's Dance DTLA and past TMC Arts programs.

KELSEY VIDIC was born in Florida. She began her career in costumes by interning with Brevard Music Center, STAGES St. Louis, Gomez-Gracia in London and the Santa Fe Opera. She received an MFA in Costume Design at the University of Texas at Austin.
