According to California Department of Aging, Southern California, particularly, is experiencing a significant demographic shift, with its diverse older adult population expected to grow over 150% from 2010 to 2060, and those aged 85 and older increasing by over 400%.



Internship

Alzheimer's OC Respite Program

- → A collaborative effort between the CSULB Center for Successful Aging and Alzheimer's Orange County (AlzOC), the <u>Respite Program</u> was launched in February 2024.
- → This program serves as a platform for interns to improve their communication and care skills, cultivate empathy, and nurture their creativity through direct engagement with older adults living with memoryrelated challenges.
- ★ To date, five interns participated in the Respite Program, gaining hands-on experience in providing care and support to individuals and families.

Research Internship

- ★ Research internships at the Center provide opportunities for students to expand their research skills and knowledge of aging.
- ★ This year, our research intern worked on compiling accreditation competencies and curriculum on aging in Nursing and Social Work in order to enhance workforce development efforts of the Center.
- ★ Interns represented the following majors: Psychology, Gerontology,

 Community Health Education, Health Science, Health Care Administration.

Presentations:

- ▶ Dr. Martinez was invited to present at the University of Utah Caregiver Speaker Series, January 10, 2024. The series is organized by the Family Caregiver Collaborative, an interdisciplinary collaborative led by their College of Nursing. This presentation was based on her research with Latino family caregivers for persons to dementia. Dr. Martinez also met with investigators at the University of Utah School of Nursing interested in expanding their caregiving research to diverse populations.
- ▶ Dr. Martinez and her colleague, Dr. Dennis Wiedman, retired professor emeritus from Florida International University, conducted a workshop on Translating Anthropological Knowledge to Practice in Health Professions Education: Strategies for Effective Teaching at the Annual Meeting of the American Anthropological Association in Toronto, Canada on November 16, 2023. The purpose is to better integrate anthropological knowledge in health professions education in order to advance health care practice.

Research Initiatives:

We continue to develop research initiatives aimed at addressing priority community issues and developing the workforce for an aging population.

Current research areas include:

- Research with the clinical partners and the Center for Latino Community Health to improve dementia screening and care for Latinos, addressing critical barriers to diagnosis and care.
- Collaborating with community partners and the College of Engineering to improve digital inclusivity for older adults, encouraging greater access.

Strategic Planning Updates

After six years of operation, we reviewed our accomplishments and assessed our progress. Guided by this reflection, we developed a comprehensive new Strategic Plan (released in September 2023) to steer our future efforts in workforce development and fundraising to support our ongoing initiative. Here are some of the key milestones we have achieved:

- Awarded \$132,000 in grants to faculty for four projects, serving over 150 older adults through Systemic Innovations at American Gold Star Manor.
- Initiated Colloquium Speaker Series.
- Provided \$300,000 in scholarships to 60 College of Heath and Human Service students till date.
- Co-founded <u>Long Beach Aging Services Collaborative</u>.
- Launched Internship Program and hosted 28 interns in the last five years.
- Formed an Advisory Board.
- Launched Center's website in <u>Spanish</u> and English.

Our updated plan builds on these successes, outlining our goals and strategies for the coming years. We remain dedicated to advancing education, research, and community engagement in the field of aging.
