POSC BASICS FOR NEW TRANSFERS

New to CSULB as a POSC major, but not new to college?

Wondering how your past coursework helps you to achieve your bachelor's degree? Need to plan your first semester? Want tips about how to make the most of your time at CSULB so you can achieve your post-graduation goals?



ASSESS WHERE YOU STAND

Whether from a community college or a four-year school, past courses can contribute to your CSULB degree. MyCSULB shows how previous coursework fits into your general education (GE), POSC, and university requirements. Check out your Academic Requirements Report (ARR) and Transfer Credit Report. When ready, declare your POSC concentration: Global Politics, Law Politics and Policy, or Political Theory, using MyCSULB's Degree Planner tool.

POSC: As many as three lower division (LD= 100- and 200-level) courses can contribute to the POSC major:

POSC 100

or

one concentration one breadth

<< Taken POSC courses that seem relevant, but they are not showing up in your ARR?

Ask the POSC office about an advisor assessment.

GE: All students (including "GE-certified") need to take two upper-division GE capstone courses and one Writing Intensive (WI) course. Some students may have additional GE to do.

FIRST SEMESTER COURSE PLANNING TIPS

While every transfer student's situation is unique and course offerings vary by semester, here are three key tips and a sample schedule to hit the ground running:

1. Aim for 15

To stay on track for graduation, 15 units (usually five 3-unit courses) is a good semester load. Consider less if you have GPA concerns or a lot of off-campus responsibilities.

2. Take (mostly) POSC

POSC courses are the bulk of your schedule, but GE courses and second major, minor or certificate classes can strike a balance in your learning, schedule, and goals. 3. Go upper division (UD)

40 UD (300- and 400-level) units are required as part of your 120 overall units. 9 units of GE and 30 of 39 POSC major units are UD. Important if you are awaiting assessment of past LD POSC classes.

FINDING YOUR WAY AT CSULB AND BEYOND

- Weigh options early. Assess if you have the time and desire for a second major, minor, certificate, or study abroad. "Double count" POSC and/or minor classes with GE as possible.
- Stay on top of your progress. Learn how to use MyCSULB, and read the advising materials on the POSC website and emails sent to the POSC student list-serv. Engage the many specialized resource offices at CSULB that are here to help you.
